### ABOUT THE WORKSHOP

#### The Process: Are They Really Letting Me Do This Unsupervised?

This workshop will break down the interpreting process from start to finish in a medical interpreting assignment. Topics include: assignment preparation, what to do upon arrival, specific tips, best practice for working in a doctor's office vs. a hospital setting, the art of "giving report" to the next interpreter, HIPAA considerations for interpreters, Universal Codes, and Informed Consent.

#### The Science: Danger! Danger! Don't Get Any On Ya!

This workshop will prepare medical interpreters to work in medical settings while remaining safe and avoiding infection exposure. Concepts taught during this session include: infectious diseases, PPE (personal protection equipment), contact precautions, droplet precaution, airborne precautions, interpreting in the operating room including specific instruction on the sterile field, bioterrorism and suggested vaccinations.

# **OBJECTIVES**

- Participants will outline four ways to approach a medical assignment, both in an office based or a medical center.
- Participants will identify three ways to differentiate between universal codes They will analyze and review five key elements of informed consent medical paperwork.
- Participants will develop and implement a plan to give report to one another with specific emphasis placed on which information is HIPAA compliant and need-toknow.
- Participants will experiment with various real-life medical assignment scenarios, formulating proper plans for working with a deaf client in the face of many different possible situations.
- Participants will identify four infectious and communicable diseases.
- They will be able to put these work-related dangers into three categories with reference to levels of protections, vaccinations, precautions needed for each disease.
- They will also demonstrate proper technique for performing job duties in a mock operating room situation to avoid the sterile field or contaminating any areas.
- Participants will experiment with various real-life medical assignment scenarios
